Hostels from hell: the 'supported housing' that blights Birmingham

The private hostels are meant to care for vulnerable homeless people. But as crime soars, users suffer and neighbours despair, questions are being asked



Britain's second largest city is now the centre of this burgeoning market, which despite receiving millions of pounds of public money every week to help people turn their lives around stands accused of leaving vulnerable people with little or no support. Birmingham has seen the number of bedspaces in these hostels and shared houses double from 11,000 in early 2018 to 22,000 in March this year.

Figures uncovered by The Observer reveal for the first time the 10 biggest independent providers in the country are on course to collect £184m in housing benefit this year – generating on average more than $\pounds 11,600$ every year for each of the nearly 16,000 bedspaces they supply.

came to B30 Foodbank in desperate need. He is living in garage. There are no washing facilities and no furniture. Lenny only has a single gas burner to heat food on. He has no money because his benefits were stopped after he missed an appointment.

Lenny was given suitable food and also contact made with a specialist benefits adviser to help unravel the benefits problem.





Dana

Was very agitated and anxious when she came to the foodbank. She eventually explained that she was in serious debt and is scared to answer a knock at the door or the phone. In addition to food, she was offered the support of a debt advisor. Initially reluctant Dana said it's really hard to talk to someone when it's hard to admit how bad things are even to myself. We arranged for the adviser from the Project to text her first so she knows who is ringing her.

Derek

Was very anxious when he came to the foodbank with no voucher referral. He finds it very hard to make his Universal Credit last to the last of the month. He is severely dyslexic and has no phone, so negotiating the benefits system and accessing support it very difficult. We arranged for The Project Support Worker to phone his friend who would then fetch Derek.

Derek left the foodbank carrying 3 bags of food and toiletries. He was much calmer and happier than when he arrived.

Shaz

Is an Asylum Seeker having escaped persecution in Iran. He lives on £35 per week allowance and is not entitled to other benefits. B30FB ensured he got both food and support from 'Migrant Help'.
